

# **Study Optimization Phase**

The Optimization Phase of the SMaRRT-HD Study is well underway. The purpose of this study phase is to improve our workflows and make sure our research plans work in the real world of dialysis care. This phase will help us improve our study materials, trainings, and communication as well as workflow for administering the SMaRRT-HD survey during dialysis care. Three North Carolina and Massachusetts clinics that are not participating in the Trial Phase are taking part in this preparatory work. We look forward to sharing more about the findings from this phase at the December Stakeholder Panel Meeting. **Below** is an overview of the research activities that will take place in clinics participating in the **upcoming Trial Phase**.

"I am excited to see if [SMaRRT-HD] can help us understand and communicate with our Spanish-speaking patients. The language barrier can sometimes be a hindrance to the timeliness of resolution for issues. This way, the patients can pinpoint concerns, and they can be addressed in a timely manner."

#### What inspires you?

"I am inspired everyday by the dedication and discipline displayed by the patients dealing with kidney failure. It is a life altering situation none of them signed up for. Having a meaningful impact on their lives and outcomes is very rewarding. I am obtaining my nursing degree so that I can better help the patients from another aspect of the healthcare team. I get so much joy out of what I do. Seeing the smiles we bring to the patients adds another dimension of satisfaction for what I do."


#### What excites you most about the SMaRRT-HD Study?

In May 2022, Kidney Disease: Improving Global Outcomes (KDIGO) held a Controversies Conference about symptom complications of dialysis in Berlin, Germany. Participants included patients, physicians, behavioral therapists, nurses, pharmacists, and researchers. SMaRRT-HD Study team members, **Jenny Flythe, Laura Dember, Mark Unruh, and John Ortiz** all participated! The group worked together to identify optimal ways to address symptom-based complications in people treated with dialysis. They also outlined foundational principles and consensus points related to identifying and addressing dialysis-related symptoms and described gaps in knowledge and priorities for research.

The article summarizes key conference findings. One of the main consensus points was the importance of involving all members of the multi-disciplinary team (kidney doctors, nurses, PCTs, social workers, dietitians, pharmacists, psychologists (when available), and other specialists) in the monitoring and treatment of symptoms. There is no question that improving dialysis-related symptoms will take a TEAM effort, but there is much to learn! We hope the SMaRRT-HD Study will help answer important questions like: "How can we better monitor and follow up on patient symptoms? and "How can we incorporate regular symptom reporting by patients and symptom follow up by care teams in routine dialysis care?"
